GENERAL INFORMATION

SPECIAL NOTE

Applying for foundation support is a time-consuming process on both sides. Before deciding to apply to the Foundation, please review our operating principles, funding limitations, and the objectives and results we seek as set out in this document. Thank you.

MISSION

To support programs and institutions that enrich the quality of life in New York City, with a particular focus on initiatives that help individuals, families, and communities benefit from the services and opportunities that will enable them to achieve their full potential.

VALUES

In carrying out our mission and making choices about how to invest our grantmaking dollars, we are guided in our selection process by our results-based orientation and by several overarching values that cut across program-area lines. These values are access, system-wide improvement, prevention and early intervention, self-sufficiency, the provision of high-quality services, and a focus on vulnerable populations.

The Altman Foundation:

- Seeks to increase meaningful access for New Yorkers to quality programs, institutions, and resources, both public and private;
- Encourages system-wide improvement and change while at the same time maintaining our tradition of direct service and the opportunity to test models in action;
- Prefers to support preventive and early intervention strategies;
- Supports efforts that help New Yorkers build and preserve self-sufficiency;
- Encourages innovation and funds programs and organizations that provide high-quality services based on best practices in their field and that exercise systematic efforts to track credible and meaningful results; and
- Has an interest in supporting programs that serve vulnerable populations, in particular children and youth from underserved communities, immigrants, and the elderly.

OPERATING PRINCIPLES

We define ourselves as investors and are interested in creating the highest possible levels of human gain for the grant dollars we have available. In that mode, we review proposals with the following questions in mind:

- What are the results from the project—meaning outcomes for participants—that provide the return on our investment?
- What are the chances those results will be achieved?
- Is this the best use of our money, given all alternatives before us?

To carry out our mission and achieve human gain, we make three types of investments:

1. Investments in Direct Service

In this area we support programs and projects that create human gain for people in our areas of focus. Historically, most of the grants in our portfolio have fallen into this category.

2. Investments in Capacity Building

At times we believe that making an investment in an organization so that it can achieve and sustain stronger gains for those served is the best investment we can make. In general, these investments are reserved for organizations with which we are already working.

3. Investments in Systems Change

At times we believe that the most pressing need is to make an improvement in the larger context of factors and forces that affect programs and organizations. The Foundation will allocate limited grant dollars to strategic policy, advocacy, and applied research initiatives that advance the Foundation's grantmaking priorities.

In addition, the Altman Foundation:

- Promotes connections among nonprofits, government agencies, and foundations, and other organizations doing complementary work in order to advance best practices and build knowledge within a given field;
- Seeks to leverage its limited resources by investing in issues, programs, or initiatives that have the potential to attract other funding sources, both public and private; and
- Initiates a limited number of program-related investments that provide low-cost loans to high-performing nonprofits with strong business models and the capacity to leverage other capital sources to advance effective programs or initiatives.

FUNDING LIMITATIONS

Please note the following:

As this year goes forward, we will continue our efforts to sustain high-performing current grantees seeking renewed funding.

While we have limited funds available for new, non-Foundation-initiated grantmaking, if, after reviewing our guidelines and grants lists, you believe that your work and the results you can already document achieving are directly and measurably in line with the Foundation's priorities, we want to know about what you are doing via Letter of Inquiry submitted through our grant portal, https://altman.fluxx.io. After receiving your submission, we will follow up with you if we need more information.

This does not apply to current Altman grantees, who should prepare full applications following the directions in the Proposal section on the grant portal.

General Limitations

- We fund only organizations that are recognized by the Internal Revenue Service as having 501(c)(3) status and that, as a general rule, are not private foundations.
- The Foundation does not make grants to individuals for any purpose.
- Grant requests from organizations and programs outside of the State of New York cannot be considered for funding. In addition, Altman Foundation grants focus almost without exception on organizations and programs within the five boroughs of New York City.
- As a general rule, the Foundation does not fund the following:
 - Bricks and mortar, other capital projects, or the purchase of capital equipment
 - o Galas, benefits, and other fundraising events
 - o Conferences or symposia that are not connected to current Altman grants
 - o Concerts, theater or media performances, or art exhibitions that are not connected to current Altman grants
 - Instructional programming or artist-in-residence programs within the public schools or in correctional facilities
 - Budget deficits
 - Disease-specific projects, with the exception of initiatives aligned with our guidelines
 - Public universities or ongoing programs of private colleges and universities
 - Operating expenses and ongoing services of either public or voluntary hospitals

• HEALTH •

AMENDED AND RESTATED

BY-LAWS

OF

ALTMAN FOUNDATION

Adopted as of December 18, 2018

ARTICLE I

MEMBERS

Altman Foundation (the "Corporation") shall be a membership corporation. Those individuals who are the members of the Corporation's Board of Directors (the "Board") from time to time will be the members of the Corporation, and will have the powers and authority reserved to "members" under the New York Not-for Profit Corporation Law, as amended from time to time. No separate meetings or vote of the members are required or necessary.

ARTICLE II

TRUSTEES

- Section 1. <u>Powers and Duties</u>. The business and affairs of the Corporation shall be managed by a Board of Trustees (the "Board") consisting of not more than thirteen nor less than five persons ("Trustees") as shall be fixed from time to time by the Board. The "entire Board" consists of the number of Trustees elected as of the most recently held election of Trustees, as well as any Trustees whose terms have not yet expired.
- Section 2. <u>Election and Term</u>. The Trustees shall be elected at each annual meeting of the Board and shall hold office for one year.
- Section 3. <u>Removal</u>. Any Trustee may be removed at any time, with or without cause, by the affirmative vote of two-thirds of the entire Board (other than the Trustee being removed) taken at a special meeting of the Board called for that purpose.
- Section 4. <u>Quorum and Voting</u>. Except as otherwise provided by these by-laws, or by law, at all meetings of the Trustees there shall be present at least a majority of the entire Board in order to constitute a quorum for the transaction of all business, and unless a greater proportion is required by law or by these by-laws, the vote of a majority of the Trustees present at the time of the vote, if a quorum is present at such time, shall be the act of the Trustees. Trustees may not act by proxy.

Section 5. <u>Participation by Telephone or Videoconference</u>. Any one or more Trustees may participate in a meeting of the Board by means of a conference telephone or similar communications equipment, including electronic video screen communication, allowing all persons taking part in the meeting to hear each other at the same time and to participate in all matters before the Board. Participation in a meeting by such means shall constitute presence in person at such meeting.

Section 6. Action without a Meeting. Any action required or permitted to be taken by the Board or any committee may be taken without a meeting, if all members of the Board or committee consent to the adoption of a resolution authorizing the action. Such consents may be written or electronic. If written, the consent must be executed by the Trustee or committee member by signing such consent or causing his or her signature to be affixed to such consent by any reasonable means including but not limited to facsimile signature. If electronic, the transmission of the consent must be sent by electronic mail and set forth or be submitted with information from which it can reasonably be determined that the transmission was authorized by the Trustee or committee member. The resolution and the consents thereto by the members of the Board or committee shall be filed with the minutes of the proceedings of the Board or such committee.

Section 7. <u>Resignation</u>. Any Trustee may resign at any time, with such resignation to be presented in writing to the Chair and to take effect at the time specified therein or, if no time is specified, then on delivery.

ARTICLE III

OFFICERS

Section 1. <u>Election</u>. The officers of the Corporation shall be a Chair, a President, one or more Vice Presidents, a Secretary and a Treasurer. The Chair must be a Trustee. The President may be, but need not be, a Trustee. If elected as Trustee by the Board, the President shall serve as an *ex-officio* voting member of the Board and shall serve in that capacity for so long as she or he serves as President. Any Vice-President may be, but need not be, a Trustee. If elected as Trustee by the Board, any Vice-President shall serve as an *ex-officio* voting member of the Board and shall serve in that capacity for so long as she or he serves as Vice-President. The Secretary and the Treasurer must be Trustees and one person may serve in both capacities. The offices of President and Secretary may not be held by the same person.

Section 2. <u>Term.</u> The officers shall be elected annually at the annual meeting of the Board and shall hold office for one year and until the election of their successors. Any officer may be removed at any time, with or without cause, by the affirmative vote of two-thirds of the entire Board taken at a meeting of the Board called for that purpose. In the event of a vacancy due to death, resignation or otherwise, the Board may elect officers at any meeting to fill the unexpired term until the next annual meeting of the Board.

The Board may from time to time appoint such other officers or agents as they may deem necessary or expedient.

The salaries or compensation of all officers or agents shall be fixed by the Board.

ARTICLE IV

MEETINGS

Section 1. Meetings of Trustees. An annual meeting of the Board shall be held in each year on a date, time, and place fixed by the Board. Regular meetings of the Board shall be held on such dates as may be determined by the Board. Special meetings of the Board may be called by the Chair or by any two Trustees. Written notice of the annual, regular and special meetings of the Board shall be given to each Trustee by the Secretary at least three days before the meeting at the address left with the Secretary for that purpose, including delivery of such notice by facsimile telecommunication (fax) or electronic mail.

Section 2. Waiver of Notice of Board Meetings. Any Trustee may waive notice of any meeting by submitting a waiver either before or after the meeting. Waiver of notice may be written or may be given via electronic mail. If written, the waiver must be executed by the Trustee signing such waiver or causing his or her signature to be affixed to such waiver by any reasonable means, including facsimile signature. If sent by electronic mail, the waiver must include information from which it can be reasonably determined that the transmission was authorized by the Trustee. The attendance at any Board meeting by a Trustee who does not object in writing before or at the beginning of the meeting to the failure to receive notice shall constitute a waiver of notice of such meeting.

ARTICLE V

GENERAL DUTIES OF TRUSTEES; COMMITTEES

Section 1. Management of Corporation; Committees. The Corporation shall be managed by the Board, which shall have general charge and control of the affairs, funds and property of the Corporation. The Trustees shall have full power and it shall be their duty to carry out the purposes of the Corporation according to law and as provided in these by-laws. The Board shall establish and designate from among its members such Committees of the Board deemed necessary to assist in carrying out the affairs of the Corporation, provided that in the case of any Executive Committee or similar committee however denominated, such designation shall be made by a majority of the entire Board. The Board may also establish and designate Committees of the Corporation or other advisory bodies, provided that any Committee that is not composed solely of Trustees shall not have authority to bind the Board. Committees shall report on their proceedings to the Board. Unless otherwise provided in the resolution of the Board designating a Committee, a majority of the members of such Committee shall constitute a quorum and the act of a majority of the members of such Committee present at a meeting at which a quorum is present shall be the act of such Committee. The Chair may invite the participation of persons who are not Trustees to serve on Committees of the Board as advisory members, with the

consent of the members of such Committees. However, any advisory member of a Committee of the Board may not vote and his or her attendance shall not be counted toward a quorum.

No Committee shall have authority to:

- a. Fill vacancies in the Board or in any committee;
- b. Fix the compensation of Trustees for serving on the Board or on any committee;
- c. Amend or repeal the Bylaws or adopt new Bylaws;
- d. Amend or repeal any resolution of the Board which by its terms shall not be so amendable or repealable;
- e. Elect or remove officers or Trustees;
- f. Approve a merger or plan of dissolution;
- g. Adopt a resolution recommending to the members action on the sale, lease, exchange or other disposition of all or substantially all the assets of the Corporation; or
- h. Approve amendments to the Certificate of Incorporation.

Section 2. <u>Audit Committee</u>. There shall be an Audit Committee, which shall be responsible for overseeing the quality and integrity of the Corporation's accounting, auditing and financial reporting practices. The Audit Committee shall:

- a. Oversee the accounting and financial reporting processes of the Corporation and the audit of its financial statements;
- b. Annually retain or renew the retention of an independent auditor;
- c. Review with the independent auditor the results of the audit, including the management letter;
- d. Oversee the adoption and implementation of, and compliance with, any conflict of interest or whistleblower policies; and
- e. Perform such other functions as may be required by law or by the Board.

In addition to the foregoing responsibilities, the Audit Committee shall operate in such manner and have such powers as shall be contained in its charter, if any, which shall be approved by resolution of the Board. The Audit Committee shall consist of three or more "independent directors," as defined in the New York Not-for-Profit Corporation Law. Each member of the Audit Committee shall serve for a term of one year.

ARTICLE VI

DUTIES OF OFFICERS

Section 1. Chair. The Chair will preside over all meetings of the Board, and will do and perform such other duties as may be assigned from time to time by the Board. Except as otherwise hereinafter provided by these Bylaws, or by resolution duly adopted at any meeting of the Board, the Chair will have power to sign for the Corporation all deeds and other agreements and formal instruments. In the absence or disability of the Chair, the Board, in its discretion, may

appoint a Trustee (or Trustees) to serve as interim Chair (or interim co-Chairs) to exercise the powers and functions of the Chair until such time as the vacancy is filled by the Board pursuant to Article III, Section 2.

Section 2. <u>President</u>. The President shall be the chief executive officer of the Corporation. He or she shall have general supervision and control over all of the affairs of the Corporation and shall also perform such other duties as may be prescribed from time to time by the Board. If elected as Trustee, the President shall be an *ex-officio* voting member of all Committees designated by the Board. In the absence or disability of the President, the Board, in its discretion, may appoint an interim President, who may be the Chair, to exercise the powers and functions of the President until such time as the vacancy is filled by the Board pursuant to Article III, Section 2.

Section 3. <u>Vice President</u>. The Vice President, or, if there be more than one Vice President, any Vice President shall perform such duties as may be prescribed from time to time by the Board.

Section 4. <u>Secretary</u>. The Secretary shall give notice of all meetings of the Board and shall keep the minutes of such meetings; he or she shall be the custodian of the corporate seal; and shall also perform such other duties as may properly belong to the office or as may be prescribed from time to time by the Board.

Section 5. <u>Treasurer</u>. The Treasurer shall have charge of the funds of the Corporation and shall collect all the income thereof and shall render a report of the condition of the treasury at each meeting of the Board and shall also perform such other duties as may properly belong to the office or as may be prescribed from time to time by the Board.

ARTICLE VII

FINANCIAL ADMINISTRATION

The securities of the Corporation and its evidences of property shall be kept in such manner and the moneys of the Corporation shall be deposited in such banks or trust companies, or otherwise, as the Board may from time to time designate.

Moneys belonging to the Corporation shall be disbursed upon checks or drafts signed by the Chair, President, the Treasurer, the Secretary, or such other officer or person or persons as may from time to time be designated by the Board.

ARTICLE VIII

SEAL

The seal of the Corporation shall be circular in form and shall contain in the circumference the words "Altman Foundation, New York" and in the center of the circle the words "Incorporated 1913."

ARTICLE IX

AMENDMENTS

These by-laws may be amended at any meeting of the Board by affirmative vote of a majority of the entire Board, provided that written notice of such meeting, containing the particular amendments proposed, shall be given in accordance with the notice provisions set forth in Article IV, Section 1.

ARTICLE X

INDEMNIFICATION

Section 1. Indemnification. The Corporation shall, to the fullest extent permitted by law, indemnify any person who is or was made, or threatened to be made, a party to any threatened, pending or completed, action, suit or proceeding, whether civil, criminal, administrative or investigative, including any action by or in the right of the Corporation to procure a judgment in its favor (hereinafter a "Proceeding"), by reason of the fact that such person, or a person of whom such person is the legal representative, is or was a member, Trustee or officer of the Corporation, or is or was serving in any capacity at the request of the Corporation of any other corporation, partnership, joint venture, trust employee benefit plan or other enterprise, against judgments, fines, penalties, excise taxes, amounts paid in settlement (with the written consent of the Corporation, which shall not be unreasonably withheld) and costs, charges and expenses (including attorneys' fees and disbursements), except to the extent, if any, that such indemnification would constitute self-dealing under section 4941 of the Internal Revenue Code of 1986, as amended from time to time. Notwithstanding the foregoing, no indemnification shall be provided to or on behalf of any member, Trustee or officer if a judgment or other final adjudication adverse to such member, Trustee or officer establishes that (a) his or her acts were committed in bad faith or were the result of active and deliberate dishonesty and, in either case, were material to the Proceeding so adjudicated, or (b) he or she personally gained in fact a financial profit or other advantage to which he or she was not legally entitled. Persons who are not members, Trustees or officers of the Corporation may be similarly indemnified in respect of service to the Corporation or to another such entity at the request of the Corporation to the extent the Board at any time denominates such person as entitled to the benefits of this Article X.

Section 2. <u>Advancement of Expenses</u>. The Corporation shall, from time to time, reimburse or advance to any member, Trustee or officer entitled to indemnification hereunder the funds necessary for payment of expenses, including attorneys' fees and disbursements, incurred in connection with any Proceeding, in advance of the final disposition of such proceeding, provided, however, that such expenses incurred by or on behalf of any member, Trustee or officer may be paid in advance of the final disposition of a Proceeding only upon receipt by the Corporation of an undertaking, by or on behalf of such member, Trustee or officer, (a) to repay

any such amount so advanced if a judgment or other final adjudication adverse to the member, Trustee or officer established that (i) his or her acts were committed in bad faith or were the result of active and deliberate dishonesty and, in either case, were material to the Proceeding so adjudicated, or (ii) he or she personally gained in fact a financial profit or other advantage to which he or she was not legally entitled, or (b) to repay any such amount so advanced to the extent it would constitute self-dealing under section 4941 of the Internal Revenue code of 1986, as amended from time to time.

Section 3. <u>Payment of Indemnification</u>. Any indemnification permitted hereunder (unless ordered by a court) shall be made by the Corporation only if authorized in the specific case upon a finding that the acts of the member, Trustee or officer were not committed in bad faith, were not the result of active and deliberate dishonesty, and, in either case, were material to the Proceeding, and that he or she did not personally gain in fact a financial profit or other advantage to which he or she was not legally entitled. Such finding shall be made (a) by the Board by a majority vote of a quorum consisting of Trustees who were not and are not parties to the Proceeding in question, or (b) if such a quorum is not obtainable, or even if obtainable, if a quorum of disinterested Trustees so directs, by the Board upon the opinion in writing of independent legal counsel that indemnification would not be improper under the circumstances.

Section 4. <u>Non-exclusivity</u>. The right to indemnification and advancement of expenses provided by, or granted pursuant to, this Article X shall not be deemed exclusive of any other rights to which anyone seeking indemnification or advancement of expenses may have or hereafter be entitled under any law, by-law, agreement, vote of disinterested Trustees or otherwise, both as to action in his or her official capacity and as to action in another capacity while holding such office.

Section 5. <u>Continuity of Indemnification and Advancement</u>. The indemnification and advancement of expenses provided by, or granted pursuant to, this Article X shall continue as to a person who has ceased to be a member, Trustee or officer and shall inure to the benefit of the heirs, executors and administrators of such person.

Section 6. <u>Insurance for Indemnification of Members, Trustees and Officers</u>. The Corporation shall have the power to purchase and maintain insurance to indemnify (a) itself for any obligation which it incurs as a result of the indemnification of members, Trustees and officers under the provisions of this Article X or (b) any member, Trustee or officer in instances in which they may be indemnified under the provisions of this Article X, against any liability asserted whether or not the Corporation would have the power to indemnify such person against such liability under the laws of the State of New York, as provided in and subject to the limitations imposed under Section 726 of the New York Not-for-Profit Corporation Law (or any successor section).

Section 7. Securing Payment of Indemnification of Advancement. To secure payment of any obligation of indemnification or advancement of expenses provided, or granted pursuant to, this Article X, the Corporation may create a trust fund, grant a security interest or use other means (including, without limitation, a letter of credit) to insure the payment of such sums as may become necessary to effect indemnification or advancement of expenses as provided herein.

Section 8. Contract Between the Corporation and Members, Trustees and Officers. The provisions of this Article X shall be a contract between the Corporation and each member, Trustee and Officer who serves in such capacity at any time while this Article X is in effect, pursuant to which the Corporation and each such person intend to be legally bound. No repeal or modification of this Article X shall affect any rights or obligations then existing or thereafter arising with respect to any state of facts then or theretofore existing or thereafter arising or any proceeding theretofore or thereafter brought or threatened based in whole or in part upon any such state of facts.

Section 9. Enforceability. The right to indemnification and reimbursement and advancement of expense provided in this Article X shall be enforceable by any person entitled to indemnification of expenses hereunder in any court of competent jurisdiction. The burden of proving that indemnification or reimbursement and advancement of expenses are not appropriate shall be on the Corporation. Neither the failure of the Corporation (including the Board or independent legal counsel) to make a determination prior to the commencement of a Proceeding that indemnification or advances are proper in the circumstances nor a determination that such person is not entitled to indemnification or to the reimbursement or advancement of expenses, shall constitute a defense to the action or create a presumption that such person is not so entitled. Such person shall also be indemnified for all expenses incurred in connection with successfully establishing his or her right to indemnification or advances, in whole or in part, in any such proceeding.
